Readings for today: Isaiah 62:1-5; 1 Corinthians 12:4-11; John 2:1-11

Dear friends,

There is a modern phenomenon called FoMO. It's an acronym for the "Fear of Missing Out". It is the fear that all the excitement is happening elsewhere, an anxiety that others are having more fun, a better experience, a more exciting party, a more rewarding holiday, a more satisfying life than we are. Psychologists say this "fear of missing out" is a real emotional state and a growing problem, particularly among the young, and is exacerbated by social media. It is much easier to sound more exciting on-line than in real life.

It used to call it "social envy". We are worried that there isn't enough fun to go around. In fact, we convince ourselves that there isn't enough of anything to go around. The perception of scarcity - this fear of missing out - governs much of our behaviour. Almost everything tells us that there just isn't enough for everyone. The great myth of scarcity teaches us to get what we can, when we can, for ourselves, and clutch onto it and never let it go - or else we will miss out.

And the irony is that it is this very attitude that creates scarcity because it creates a lack of a whole variety of things. It is our fear that there simply isn't enough for everyone that produces a shortage of just about everything. This explains, in part at least, why there is poverty in a world that is so rich, why there is starvation in a world that is so wasteful of food, why there are disproportionate wages in a world where a few are paid exorbitant salaries while others live below the poverty line.

But there is another story that Jesus wants to tell. Jesus teaches us the truth of abundance. We don't need to live with the fear of missing, because the truth is that God is a lavish, abundant God who wants the very best for us. It is safe to share and to be generous, we don't need to horde and gather only for ourselves; we don't need more than enough. That is the truth that Jesus' shares at the wedding at Cana, and he reinforces the message over and over again. Water can become wine - not just any wine but the very best wine - and a couple of loaves of bread and a few fish can feed thousands. A little act of love can have lifetime consequences. A small gesture of acceptance can transform a troubled heart. A few words of forgiveness can set people free. One life can change the world.

Knowing the truth of abundance is not about living recklessly. It is about trusting in God's overwhelming goodness and about recognising that our fear of missing out, in whatever form it takes, is destructive. If we are continually looking around at what others have, we miss what is right in front of us.

The invitation we receive from Jesus this week is to see our lives through new eyes, "The best wine list is the one right in front of you. See your life anew and taste it afresh." We mightn't have everything in our lives that we hope for or need right now, at this moment good wine does take time to mature. But the ingredients are there, already present in our lives. Let us not miss out on the goodness that God gives to each and everyone one of us here and now. May our fear of missing out be replaced by the joy of discovering the abundance of God's gifts.

The kingdom of God is justice and joy; for Jesus restores what sin would destroy. God's power and glory in Jesus we know; and here and hereafter the kingdom shall grow.

The kingdom of God is mercy and grace; the captives are freed, the sinners find place, the outcast are welcomed God's banquet to share; and hope is awakened in place of despair.

The kingdom of God is challenge and choice: believe the good news, repent and rejoice! His love for us sinners brought Christ to his cross: our crisis of judgement for gain or for loss.

God's kingdom is come, the gift and the goal; in Jesus begun, in heaven made whole. The heirs of the kingdom shall answer his call; and all things cry "Glory!" to God all in all.
