Dear Friends

We have spent the last two weeks watching example after example of young men and women aspiring to be the greatest sportspersons in the world, who have pushed the limits of personal endurance and who have enjoyed well-deserved accolades.

Last week, I attended a concert at QPAC presented by the Queensland Symphony Orchestra. The major work played was *Ein Heldenleben* (A Hero's Life) composed by the great German composer Richard Strauss (d.1949). It is in the form of what is known as a tone poem, a highly descriptive or story piece, in this case describing aspects of the life of the classic hero – their story, their struggles and their ultimate transformation – certainly an overwhelming listening experience scored as it was for a huge orchestra numbering over a 100 players.

What I have been wondering ever since, however, is why this music was, in fact, so 'heroic'. It wasn't just the allencompassing sound and the unanimity of the players; nor was it the musical themes or harmony, complex as they were yet extraordinary in their combination.

For me, here was a singular expression of the depth of the human spirit – that same quality we read about, for example, in Psalm 8 which expresses humankind's profound role in God's plan. I began to realise, in spite of the grandeur of the music that was being played, that heroism is not really about triumphalism, notoriety or achievement.

You and I may never end up being a Nelson Mandela, nor a St Mary MacKillop, nor an Olympic gold medal recipient for that matter. But what we can be, and hopefully will be, is the 'hero' of the Gospel – the hero who doesn't walk disparagingly past the homeless person on the street; the hero who checks an unkind word before it is uttered; the hero who smiles at and welcomes a lost soul; the hero who gives, and gives again, without ever expecting a return.

A hero's life is a life that does not wallow in the admiration of others nor the glory of success. A hero's life is a story of humility, a humility that acknowledges the dignity of our humanness before God. It is a humility that enables us to transcend the difficulties which confront us each day and opens our heart to embrace a world of God's making – a Gospel – where we can really be the hero inspired by a true Hero's life.






