
Personal Prayer for Forgiveness

1st Reading (JB): Ezekiel 37:12-14

A reading from the prophet Ezekiel *I shall put my spirit in you, and you will live.*

The Lord says this: I am going to open your graves; I mean to raise you from your graves, my people, and lead you back to the soil of Israel. And you will know that I am the Lord, when I open your graves and raise you from your graves, my people. And I shall put my spirit in you, and you will live, and I shall resettle you on your own soil; and you will know that I, the Lord, have said and done this - it is the Lord who speaks.

PSALM 50 (51) MISERERE

GOSPEL: MARK 12:28-34

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Mark This is the first commandment, and the second is similar to it.

One of the scribes came up to Jesus and put a question to him, 'Which is the first of all the commandments?' Jesus replied, 'This is the first: Listen, Israel, the Lord our God is the one Lord, and you must love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, with all your mind and with all your strength. The second is this: You must love your neighbour as yourself. There is no commandment greater than these.' The scribe said to him, 'Well spoken, master; what you have said is true: that he is one and there is no other. To love with all your heart, with all your understanding and strength and to love your neighbour as yourself, this is far more important than any holocaust or sacrifice.' Jesus, seeing how wisely he had spoken said, 'You are not far from the kingdom of God.' And after that no one dared to question him any more.

The Gospel of the Lord. *Praise to you, Lord Jesus Christ.*

EXAMINATION OF CONSCIENCE

Prayer, fasting and almsgiving are the three pillars of Lent. Let us reflect upon our Lenten time in light of these three aspects of our pilgrimage towards Easter.

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Prayer is the intentional habit of paying attention to the presence of God. It is being aware that we are part of a bigger story, that our lives form part of a bigger picture. Our prayers don't change God – they change us.

- Do I see God's presence in my ordinary daily living?
- Do I take some time each day to be quiet or still?
- Do I read or listen to Scripture regularly?
- Do I see God in all creation in people, in places, in the environment?
- Do I make prayer a daily habit or do I only pray when I want from God?
- Do I place the Sunday celebration of Word and Eucharist central to my Sunday routine?

Fasting is about leaving space in our lives for God. It is not just about food, but it is about all aspects of our lives. Fasting needs to include not just the stomach, but also the mind and heart. It is a spiritual discipline that can direct our attention to the deeper things in life.

- Have I given up some of my time and spent it with loved ones, or the sick and the house bound?
- Have we given some time to spiritual reading or quality reflection time?
- Have I given up words of criticism, negativity, gossip and taken up words of affirmation, gratitude, kindness?
- Have I given up some food or drink, and become more conscious of my spiritual hunger and thirst?
- Have I given up rushing meals and instead, taken time to sit at table with others and enjoyed the food and company?
- Have I given up a hardened or prejudiced heart and prayed to forgive people who have hurt me and have I allowed anger to be transformed into patience, self-interest into compassion, suspicion into trust, loneliness into hospitality, and alienation into friendship?

Almsgiving is a practical way in which we show our concern for justice. We offer the gifts God has given us and share them for the common good. It helps us to realise that all things belong to God and that we are merely care-takers of the world resources.

- Have I been thankful for all the blessings and gifts God has given me?
- Have I turned away from apathy and indifference and become involved in a social justice or charitable project?
- Have I made an effort to see people of other nationalities, other creeds, other cultures, as my brothers and sisters?
- Have I offered some of my money, my goods, my talents to those who are in need?
- Have I challenged others when I have heard racist comments or judgmental statements?
- Have I been willing to overcome self-centeredness and selfishness, and serve the community through building-up the common good of all?

Lent is the journey to the great heart of our faith – the Paschal Mystery. It is a time of grace and renewal. May we be conscience of the ways in which God is calling us to conversion and transformation, and may we co-operate with God's loving presence so that we can come to Easter with mind and heart renewed.

PRAYER IN SILENCE

Pause to consider and name the areas of your life which are in need of God's compassion, mercy and healing. Imagine the faces of those people with whom you may need to be reconciled.
